

The Offtrack Is On Track

Art co-op stations itself in a depot by KAREN KENTON For North County Panorama

ENCINITAS — Anki Vinberg, small, bright eyed and animated, speaks glowingly of her participation as one of ten members of the Offtrack Gallery located in the old train depot on Highway

"We encourage one another," she says. "That's important to me — all the support."

The cooperative art gallery originally was called the Artgarden and was located in Del Mar's Stratford Square (since 1975). The group moved into its new space beneath the Pannikin in mid-May, and with a new name and a slightly new image, became Offtrack Gallery.

Once the old train station is entered, the smell of fresh brewed coffee in the Pannikin alerts the senses to be prepared for something delicious. But one quickly discovers there is soul libation here too. Immediately to the left of the entry is a staircase, leading down to the gallery. A subtle array of pleasing forms, shapes and colors present themselves against a white background. This is no musty basement. It is a bright, friendly gallery of art and crafts, created by its members.

The work covers a wide spectrum: from acrylic paintings to handwoven blouses, from batik wall hangings to decorated slippers, from mirrors with blown glass handles, to handwoven baskets and ceramic weed pots.

Vinberg's fine weavings, handwoven wearable (a beige woven short sleeve blouse, a red long sleeve shirt), and tapestries (a traditional Swedish weaving of dark brown and sandy tones) hang in the gallery, adding their design and grace to the overall ambiance of the gallery.

A dentist in Sweden, Vinberg found she couldn't practice here, "So I started weaving. All children in Sweden learn to weave in school, and I always loved it. After a while," she add, "I had quite an inventory of weavings. I guess I have all the tablecloths I'll need for a lifetime."

Nancy Gordon, a potter, was a member of this cooperative several years ago, and recently has rejoined the group. In the meantime, her life led her to teaching in San Diego and Chula Vista schools as an artist-in-residence, and to spending one year on an Indian reservation, teaching pottery there. Gordon learned her craft 11 years ago in Seattle, Wash., parks and recreation program. "I was a pregnant social worker at the time," she laughs. The love of ceramics then just grew into a full-time profession.

Her porcelain pieces are varied. Some involve the application of molds made from cameos, with areas of texture created by pressing the clay into cloth. These have a nostalgic, feminine flair. Another container has been fired in sawdust, a primitive method of firing which she experimented with while on the reservation. This piece has the fragile look of a black petalled rose.

The need for some new life in the gallery became evident this part year, according to members.

"Business was rather slow in Del Mar," says Vinberg.
"We decided to scout for a new spot, and when we saw this place, we knew this was it. The surroundings have given new life to us, and we really came together in the work. We painted it, put down the carpeting and tiles."

The gallery space is a testament to the energy the members have invested in it.

Anki Vinberg's woven shawls and blouses lend a quiet, caring tone.

Nancy Gordon's pottery adds a complementary contrast to Gwen Truax's sturdy stoneware mugs, flasks and casseroles. Truax uses the englobe method. Englobe stain is brushed on the pieces, then carved or scraped off to reveal the clay color, thus creating the pattern. Truax has worked with pottery for 15 years, was at one time an elementary school teacher, and now teaches at UCSD's craft center.

Britta King's extremely detailed paper cuttings, called Scherenschnitte, hang in their small frames waiting for closer inspection. Britta, who is from Germany, learned the nearly lost folk art in her native country, The intricate cuttings are made from long cotton fiber paper, then mounted on rag-

board.

Georgia Laris' acrylic paintings, unusual fiber jewelry, and gaily decorated slippers add brilliant splashes of color in tones of maroon, pink, purple and blue. Laris who has been an elementary art teacher, now teaches at Mesa College and at UCSD's craft center.

Two artists work in batik.

Lucia Millard-Barckley designs fabric with her flowing batik designs, then goes a step further and creates clothing from that material. She has recently learned the art of papermaking, and several framed examples of this delicate and subtle art hang in small plastic frames. One especially interesting assemblage is entitled "The Doll's House."

Dona Hutchins also does batik. Her colors are brilliant and intense. Dona, who has a bachelor's degree in anthropology, is strongly influenced by a love of nature and the ocean, and her art reflects this interest.

Nancy Rupp's oriental watercolors make their own distinct statement — strong and simple. Rupp, who studied with Jean Chua Shen, is an award winning Chinese brush painter.

Mark Vranesh's watercolors, many of San Diego scenes, are a combination of sensitive loose brush strokes and fine detail. Vranesh, who has a law degree, also creates strong, bountiful baskets. The structure of his baskets is grapevine, and the weaving in many of them is split leaf philodendron. His baskets are an excellent example of how the gallery members are inspired by one another. "Before I was in the gallery, I knew nothing about fiber," says Vranesh. "Now I've been introduced to the whole realm."

Michael Parker is the newest member of the group. His stained glassworks explores the possibilities of depth and texture in leaded glass. In one piece, titled, "Spheres," he uses more than one layer of glass. The light passing through the panes gives an added dimension to the work.

The artists participate in all phases of the gallery, each not only displaying their work, but taking turns "sitting:" in the gallery several times a month. On any day customers can meet at least one of the members.

"Any day you are here, at least three members come in, just because we like it here, and we like one another," Nancy Gordon says. "Several days a week, I'll think "I need to go to the Offtrack for coffee."

Each member also contributes by paying monthly dues, and by contributing to the cooperative 10 percent of their profit for work sold. In this way shop expenses are shared.

Monthly meetings are held to conduct business and to make group decisions, such as jurying new members. The group focus is evident in their choice of occasional new members.
