The Kimbles love to travel and have done a lot of it, having as an example, visited every state in the 'yewessay' minus Havaii in their Beechcraft Baron. Jack Kimble has flown for 22 years. Vada refers to herself as a "white knuckle flyer".

How about Vada the artist? Apparently with Vada the seeds for artistic endeavor came with the package, but lay dormant until they sprouted when time was available for addressing the long-held desire to paint. As a member of SDAG from 1969, Vada started in carnest to learn the rudiments of this challenging craft by taking lessons from multi media art instructors. Oil lessons from Hank Zandbergen and Pearl Merill; watercolor from Thelma Houston and Irving Shapiro; acrylics from Maxine Custer, Ruth Eyrich and Alexander Ross. Given a choice of Media, Vada gravitates towards acrylics and based on her success in this field, it is certainly her strong suit.

Vada's theory shout painting should be a comfort to all of us who struggle: "If you do one out of twenty paintings that you like, you're lucky!" Amen. She also states that "the more you study and paint, the more you need to know."


