Take a hike — through our own local art world

The Leucadia Art Association is living proof of the reason for its existence. Founded two years ago by Rancho Santa Fe watercolorist Patricia Watkins, it served as a promotional umbrella for six galleries within a mile of each other on Highway 101 in Leucadia. This year it encompasses 10 galleries.

Furthermore, three of them are brand-new to the area. What better demonstration of Leucadia's growing prosperity is an art community could we require?

The art association, formerly the Leucadia Gallery Guild, wants the public to have no doubt about the presence of local, high-quality artwork. So, for the second year it is hosting a weekend of free exhibits and demonstrations by artists associated with the galleries. LeucadiaART '88, an art walk from the 400 to the 1200 block of North Highway 101, will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

With this and other events, the association hopes to attain two goals: "We're getting the word out that we're here. Also in these activities we're serving the community," said Watkins.

By "we," Watkins means the association, of which she is the publicity director. The group has crafted its focus to appeal to working artists and arts patrons, as well as the galleries. But the second intention phrasing also refers to the artists and their

businesses, a source of art covering a palette of styles and media.

Watkins suggested that strollers start their walk at either the north or the south end, picking up a coupon at the first gallery to get stamped at each of 10 stops. The coupon allows the holder to take part in a drawing to win one of 10 donated works of art. Encinitas Mayor Rick Shea will conduct the drawing Sunday at 4 p.m. at Leucadia Park.

The participating art galleries, starting at the south end, are:

1 Glass Orchid opened shop recently with stained glass and silk flower sculptures by artists and designers Robbie Santolucito and Gregg Randels. Santolucito also serves as art association treasurer for 1988.

2 Offtrack Gallery, housed with the Pannikin coffeeshop, has Nancy Rupp's Chinese brush paintings on the feature wall. Additional works include ceramics, paper and schenachmittle works and jewelry.

3 Basil Street Cafe and Gallery, a new member, exhibits elegant hand-blown glass vases and lamps by Steven Stridshaw.

4 Stanhope Gallery, owned by association Vice President Julie Stanhope, carries corporate and home artworks by nationally known artists. Now on display are seascapes by Imogen and lithographs by Russell Chudson.

5 Leucadia Art Gallery changes shows six times a year, featuring various

painting and sculpture media. Its widely known and local artists Etienne Buissonage, Christian Tordell and featured now, Queen Morgan Mullery, own the adjacent Corner Frame Shop and is 1988 association president.

6 Corner Frame Shop has an eclectic offering of art, in addition to some 2000 frame choices.

7 San Diego Art Guild has five rooms with rotating exhibits of original works by the guild's 100-plus members. Pam Sarkison's oil paintings and Mary Reid's watercolors currently hang on the feature wall.

8 Windsteppe Gallery, another newcomer to Highway 101, specializes in Southwestern art and artifacts. Owner Peter Allen previously represented many of the artists whose work shows here: Doug West, Kansas Reed and Fritz Schudler are a few.

9 Seewald's Gallery showcases the photography of owner Michael Seewald, as well as exhibits by nationally established shooters.

10 Options, opened this year by Glenn Eschell, features abstract wood and metal sculptures.

Leucadia is a natural setting for this focus in artistic enterprises, Watkins feels. "It has been a haven where artists have lived for years. We're just trying to take it one step further, and get the community involved."

The weekend, the community will take that step — along Highway 101.

Artist is a cut above the rest

Britta Kling just won't cut it out.

That's right. This Lewandis artist won't quit cutting out Scherenschnitte stems from a childhood fascination with intricate and exquisite designs seen in museums and galleries in Europe. Kling is self taught, and when asked how long one small work

took, she specializes in this historical art.

Kling's work is either done in a traditional, simple, symmetrical style or in a more intricate floral style. The traditional designs are small and round with quaint hearts, leaves, and trees. These easier cuttings look as if they should be on the walls of a cabin in the woods somewhere in Switzerland.

Kling is a native of Germany, but has lived in Lewandis for the last 15 years, and considers it home. However, Kling has spent 30 years perfecting the art of Scherenschnitte — a traditional, once nearly extinct, but recently revived form of German folk art.

This local artist believes that the art of scissor cutting probably originated in China, and was brought to Europe by Marco Polo or other travelers around the time of Marco Polo. At that time guide a few European countries picked up the cutting technique, now known as Scherenschnitte, that eventually became especially popular in Poland and Germany.

This art expression was translated into a country art or folk art that involved cutting a folded piece of paper to create a symmetrical design similar to cutting out a paper doll.

Yet around the late 19th century with the invention of the camera and its popularity in Europe, Scherenschnitte almost disappeared. Only in the last 30 years or so has it been practiced again on a small scale, and Kling is one of the few artists in California



shows at the Off Track Gallery book to complete Kling replies, "Oh, 30 years. It has taken me that long to learn how to do this."

The cutouts that Kling creates are made with special Scherenschnitte black paper that she brings over from Germany. Kling draws the design on the opposite side of the paper which is white, and never uses a pattern or cuts a design more than once. Six different pairs of scissors are used as well as a scalpel to cut out the tiny details of the paper. The actual cutting is then placed on hand made paper of various grass, rice, or cotton ragboard with "Yes" glue that will not disintegrate over time.

The floral designs are larger and more complex. They are not folded in half to get a symmetrical pattern, but are created in book more like a painting. Kling draws and cuts only realistic, botanical, correct flowers that she observes in her garden or on sampling trips.

"Alpha and Omega" is an extremely ornate Scherenschnitte which literally took Kling three months to complete. This work is large and round, and depicts a cycle of flowers in the four seasons of the year. Daffodils are intertwined with other spring flowers giving way to roses and irises of summer, thistles of autumn, and

finally holly and poinsettias of winter.

Kling's art is gentle and unpretentious. It is not highly sophisticated, modern, or bold. It is delicate and simple in a pure and innocent way. Technically speaking it is excellent due to the detail and perfection of every cut.

One wonders, how could anyone cut out such small and perfect holes in paper without slipping and cutting off a stem? "Very carefully," Kling replies.

A paper cutting Scherenschnitte workshop led by Kling will be held at the Athenaeum in La Jolla Nov. 14, 15, and 16. For more information, call 454-0872.
