# Winners without a ribbon

he current judged art show at the San Dieguito Art Guild in Leucadia has some real winners winners that never got a ribbon.

The front room, where the show is being exhibited in the small yellow gallery, is filled with many different types of oil, acrylic, watercolor, and pastel paintings by 20 guild members.

Many of the larger and more colorful works are pinned with blue, red, and white ribbons. Plus scattered about are several others which have kelly-green honorable-mention ribbons. But some of the less obvious smaller paintings, those that aren't hanging front and center, have a genius of their own that was not recognized by Ken Goldman, the San Diego artist who juried the show and handed out the trophies.

For instance, "Survivor" by Helen Ramsey of Carlsbad, should have received first place for perhaps "The Best Little Watercolor in Leucadia." This piece is hung so closely to the

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floor, beneath countless other dwarfing works, that one has to get down on bended knee to give it the royal attention it deserves.

Ramsey's shy sleeper portrays the front of an old gray house with a white picket fence around it. The sullen mood of the work pulls you in. The house looks haunted and strange, as if it holds powerful secrets about the generations that have lived there.

The picket fence is falling apart and is bare in spots. The entry way is dark, as well as the front window which has been painted dark blue. The overgrown trees and bushes around the house are bending over it, and even the sky in the background looks gray, rumbling, and ready to storm.

The impressionistic and

expressionistic qualities of Ramsey's jewel captures the soul of that house. The painting is like a story, sucking you into the surviving building's mysterious past, present, and future.

First place for the oil/acrylic category could have gone to "Heidi-a-Sketch" by Dori Starkey of Rancho Santa Fe. This nude of a young and voluptuous girl is impressionistic but not dull or prosaic as many impressionistic nudes painted in the last 200 years can be.

The reclining girl's position is angular and striking, and in the upper left hand corner a few large streaks of purple have been painted passionately over a bare area of white canvas that is left exposed. Finally, Greta Grossman's oil and acrylic works "Where the Waters Meet" and "Heaven Knows" could have come in second and third. Out of all the artists in the show, Grossman's wildly expressionistic work has the most developed recognizable style.

"Heaven Knows" is a landscape scene with big green trees and a path leading through them. The brush strokes are rather large, and like a hurried, forious form of pointalism. One cannot look at this painting too closely, because the eyes have a tendency to want to cross looking at the overabundance of blurred movement.

### ARTIST PROFILE - MILLIE WAELCHLI

Isn't it curious how some people have an explosive persona while others wait to be discovered? And isn't it grand that we live in a world in which the mix of humanity bears no boredom?

Millie Waelchli (pronounced Welk-ly) epitomizes the clicke that speaks of the deepness of still waters. She is quietly pleasant and unobtrusive and yet blending into the wallpaper isn't her style by a long shot. The fact is, the dimensions of her character emerge slowly and each surfacing is a surprise package.

If Millie was not born with a fistful of pigments and brushes, the talent required to register seismologically significant on the Richter Scale of art came with the package. It didn't take long for tiny fingers to find and experience the wonder of kids crayons. From that point to this, literally, she developed a seminal mind-lock that would propel her into a persistant experimentation in all media of the art field: watercolor, acrylic, oil, batik, etching, silk screen and drawing in ink, pencil, charcoal and pastel. In Millie's words, "I try every technique that interests me that I come across in galleries, art shows and books and combine them in my own work."

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In Denver, Colorado, Millie worked in "where-else-but-in-an-art-store" where she met Mr. Right. However, Ronald Waelchli, also an artist, was obliged to buy out half the store before the future Mrs. Waelchli uttered the solumn 'I-do' words. The union produced one helr and one heiress and two grandloves. Ronald Waelchli died 15 years ago.

Up until 2½ years ago when Millie joined SDAG, her art life unfolded in Colorado. She spent a year at Cakland's College of Arts and Crafts and an additional one learning watercolor, life drawing and color design from the Art Director of the University of Denver. Her workshop experiences include nationally known artists such as Edgar Whitney, Morio Cooper. Robert Wood, Gerald Browner, Chen Chi, Virginia Cobb and others.

In 1958 she was a Charter Member of Foothills Art Center in Golden, Colorado, "well known now for its Rocky Mountain Watermedia Show."

She held classes in her Denver suberb studio in watercolor, acrylics and drawing and had numerous one-man shows at the Arvada Center for the Arts & Humanities, Footbills Art Center and countless clubs and businesses in surrounding counties. It goes without saying that she has been accepted in prestigious juried shows in Colorado and has earned many awards.

One needs to just examine her work - to witness its consistant excellence and versatility - to agree that the title of consummate artist aprly fits Millie Waelchli.

# **Budding young artists**

## Seven galleries display their colorful work

NCINITAS - If you didn't know the artists were elementary school students, you might mistake the colorful works currently hanging in seven Leucadia art galleries for the creations of professionals working in the trendy

"primitif" mode.

Nearly 2,000 budding Picassos in 10 Encinitas elementary schools created artworks for the second annual Children's Art Festival and the winners' works are on display in local galleries through Feb. 11. The young artists mixed watercolors with tissue paper to create stained glass-like mixed media pieces and assembled pipe cleaners, seashells, bottle caps, shoelaces, pebbles, leaves, eucalyptus buds and other found objects to make colorful sculptures. Some snipped designs in paper while others made paintings or pastels.

"The kids were very creative," observed Leucadia artist Patricia Watkins, one of the contest judges and a co-founder of the Leucadia Art Association which sponsors the event

Students in grades K-6 at Capri, Flora Vista, Ocean Knoll, Paul Ecke Central School, Pacific View, Parkdale Lane, La Costa Heights, Rhodes, Encinitas Christian and Leucadia Montessori participated in the contest. Entries were judged by area artists on the basis of the use of color, originality, design and craftsmanship. Ribbons were awarded to winners in four categories (drawing, media. wetercolor buxing

assemblage) and three age levels.

Winners works are exhibited alongside adult artwork in the seven Leucadia Art Asociation member galleries: Stanhope, Offtrack, The Corner Frame Shop, Windsteppe, the Glass Orchid, the San Dieguito Art Guild, and Leucadia Gallery. All are on Highway 101 between La Costa Avenue and Encinitas Blvd.

The more than 200 winning works will be assembled and exhibited in an outdoor art festival at Leucadia Roadside Park from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 12. Encinitas Mayor Anne Omstead will speak at the conclusion of the event, which aims to encourage artistic endeavors of young people in the community, according to Morgan Mallory, president of the sponsoring Leucadia Art Association.

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The conceptual combination of those two figures is fascinating in itself, but even more so since this work is detailed and accurately drawn. The picture looks exactly like a tall, lanky nuteracker standing straight and still in camouflage Lindell's nutcracker comes complete with an intricate bullet bandolier, machine gun, and is standing in what looks like a desert with two trees, and a prickly cactus.

Another surprising work is a watercolor done by kindergartener Patrick Rosa, also of La Costa Heights. If one didn't know it, and if this painting were in any gallery, it would be considered a true piece of art drawn by an advanced adult.

This untitled work is filled with brilliant neon color, and in its seemingly overall abstraction, one can see an entire landscape and sunset within it. The sky is swirling pink and orange, with a lime sea, and bleeding blue plants on its beaches. It is hard not to stare at this piece and say, "Wow, are you sure the artist is only of

For the second year, the Leucadia Art Association has organized and judged the annual Children's Art Festival that is currently on display at six galleries in Leucadia. #### ARTIST PROFILE - Tom Judson

He was too busy scrambling for survival dollars to indulge in a formal education, although in 1934, through the beneficence of the erstwhile W.P.A. he received limited art lessons at the Walker Art Institute in Minneapolis. However, there is no denying that here was a talent waiting to happen. Tom Judson paints sea-going vessels - in oils - and he paints them exceedingly well, giving the term representational art its intended definition.

Tom Judson was born in Des Moines, Iowa where he completed his schooling. In 1933 he became a husband and remained one for fifty four years. Pre-War job hustling garnered assorted gigs such as bartender and cook. When global hostilities began, this man who would eventually retire to a career of painting ships went to sea as a member of the Merchant Marines. After the war and a move to Glendale, California, Judson became a potter with the Franciscan Dinnerware operation remaining in this position until his retirement in 1974 in Encinitas.

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When Tom Judson hit Encinitas, he wasted little time in integrating himself into the art Community, beginning with his membership in the San Diegulto Art Guild. The fruition of Judson's dormant fascination with art was for him "like coming home" and from the beginning he met the challenge head on, focusing on achieving dramatic effects, expanding his talent and "getting away from the flat, postcard effect" evidenced in some paintings.

Tom Judson is not only a fine artist, he is also a craftsman. This distinction is best exemplified in this illustration. The Dutch painters of the Renaissance period used a substance they called black oil in conjunction with their oil pigmants. Tom came across this obscure piece of information and decided to try it. This involves the slow cooking of linseed oil to which lead and finally beeswax are added - a time-consuming tedious procedure. The judicious use of 'black oil' keeps colors separate, allowing them to set up at the same speed. Pigments do not get dry and chalky and never crack. 'Black oil' produces soft golds and generally softens light effects and passages.

It's called 'going the distance' - taking that extra step to improve what is already quite acceptable.

Tom Judson - artist and craftsman - a joyful man who doesn't let a single day go by without picking up a brushful of paint.
