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It isn't easy to describe, but with Marron McDowell it seems like a little smile is always hovering behind her eyes, her lips, her voice and most probably her soul. To this observer, this translates to a state of contentment.

The long-beaked birth bird deposited baby Marron in Louisiana, but her landing there was strictly 'touch and go' or as Marron puts it "I was in Monroe just long enough to be born." From thence, she grew up playing United States hopscotch, toeing down in states such as: Texas, Florida, Minnesota, California.

After completing her schooling in Dallas -"an exciting city" - Marron landed a job that any 22 year old of that ear would have, unarguably, lusted for. At Interstate Theaters, the scene was a heady mix of fantasy and glamour what with booking flicks and -ohmygosh - meeting movie stars and all.

In 1946, Marron married her girlfriend's boyfriend (with permission!). Lyle (Mac) McDowell took his bride on an odyssey that has got to be pure nirvana for any human carrying the seminal urglangs of artistic talent. His position with National Park Service provided Marron with a panorama of canvasses (Art by osmosis?) right outside her front door, and her front doors opened to parks all over the yewessay. Consider the lovely benefits of raising the McDowell progeny - one of each - under these flattering circumstances, not the least of which was learning the sadly disappearing virtue of resourcefulness - as in entertaining oneself.

How did Marron McDowell become an artist? There were stirrings all along the path. She remembers "fiddling with art for years". She recalls "a sudden rush of art enjoyment" at 6th grade level. When her son was three, she recollects "picking-up her brushes again". But it was when the children were de-nested that she became a serious artist, completing two years at the College of Marine, earning her A.A. degree and moving into the field, first as an oil painter and then, predominantly, as a watercolorist. A dynamic, award-winning excelling one.

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Her response to how she feels about her art was two-pronged and immediate. "I like involvement with people...I dearly love to be involved with people" which, belonging to the artistic environment give her. Second, painting is, for her, very simply, an intrinsic need. "When I am not painting, I feel uninvolved." Her vision is to spend more time improving her skills -"to get more inventiveimaginative". Any bets she will achieve?

This then is Marron McDowell, whose unusual first name is her Grandmother's maiden name which means "chestnut" in French. Somehow, don't ask why, it seems to fit.

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Jean Holloway of the San Dieguito Art Guild filled me in on March's membership profile. March's candidate, Ricardo Dias, uses everything in his palette to express his artistic talents. Pen and ink, oils and acrylics are some of his favorite media. His subject matter focuses on military



ARTIST PROFILE - Richard Diaz

Fill a tumbler with sea water and what do you have? A glass of colorless liquid. And yet we view the sea as a chameleon of color. Most artists learned the lesson of the reflectability of ocean waters in art classes. Richard Diaz gained this knowledge from a seascape painter named Thompson in Mystik, Connecticut at a time when he was struggling to place his superbly painted sea vessels into a watery environment that did not look fake. Thompson also taught Diaz to treat the sea as a virgin possessing her own particular rhythm.

Placing a ship in her flow is commensurate with rape in that her motion is disturbed causing directional and color changes. By studying this action, by literally 'seeing' with new insight - he was finally able, with success, to unite ship to see (male to female, so to speak) in an impressive succession of excellent nautical paintings.

It was through learning lessons such as this as opposed to an academic environment that nourished and honed the artistic tendencies of this man. His sole exposure to bona fide art lessons occurred in high school when his principal ordered him into art class after having seen an incredible pencil portrait he did of then Princess Elizabeth of England. Clearly, artistic talent flowed from ancestral sources to this family. Father Diaz, a drummer with Paul Whiteman's band, proved his talent was not limited to music when, having been teased by his sons for lacking drawing expertise, picked up a pencil and replicated the standard eye-following Christ portrait. Exactly, Brother Diaz became a commercial artist,

Richard Disz - husband, father, grandfather, artist and seaman, having graduated from Submarine School when most kids his age were still kicking around high school. His decision to opt for military service was influenced by his father - a Navy man - and by the fancy uniform he spotted on a sailor on a subway. After 23 years of, shall we say, submerging himself in the subjects he would eventually paint with such obvious pride, pleasure and avard-winning success, he retired a Lieutenant.

This then is Richard Diaz - a well rounded human being who also happens to be one back of an electrician! If you don't believe this - check out the new lighting at the Gallery.
