Some call it good karma. Others suggest a heavenly lottery in which a 'thumbs up' (lucky life) or 'thumbs down' (forget it) enactment determines future life style conditions. There is also the configuration-of-the-stars-in-the-proper-position theory. And of course, who's to say that this earthly voyage is no more than a simple crap-shoot?

Whichever or whatever, when that little bundle of joy who grew up to be Greta Grossman arrived in Helsingborg, Sweden eighty-three years ago, there began a life that would, by accentuating the positive, create a magnetic field to which abundant measures of pleasures would gravitate.

The remarkable talents of Greta Grossman were inevitable considering that at least a century of paternal ancestors were fine cabinet makers, carpenters and contractors. Her decision to become an industrial designer was considered an awesome choice of career in the zeitgeist of the era, inasmuch as in a span of 200 years no woman had ever occupied a position in this field. Nevertheless, this determined young lady achieved her apprenticeship in cabinet making in Helsingborg where as often as not she was stuck (pun intended) with cleaning the glue pots and wore out a couple of skin growths in so doing. She moved forward, perfecting her expertise at the Stockholm Institute of Industrial Design and ultimately arriving at a position where the name of Greta Grossman became synonymous with high achievement, success, excellence.

1933 marriage united this extraordinary woman to one of London's most popular bandleaders who had come to Stockholm on a gig and was so enthusiastically received he remained in Sweden.

In 1940, motivated by the growing menace of Hitler, the Grossmans fled to America 'the back way' - Via Russia, Siberia, Japan, Hawaii. Arriving in San Francisco by ship whose passengers included newsworthy notables, Greta happened (hear timing) to be interviewed by a member of the press. Sufficiently impressed with the ledy and her profession, he escorted her to the Annual San Francisco Furniture Mart where a Los Angeles furniture manufacturer (timing again), turned on by her design photos, signed her on the spot and set her up in a studio on (are you ready?) Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills. She spent 20 years on an incredible roll, designing houses and furniture - with articles regarding her design expertise appearing in prestigious national and international publications and receiving meritorius awards from the Museum of Modern Art and the Hardwood Association of America.

In 1964, when Greta Grossman noticed friends "toppling off," she opted for retirement in Leucadia and ultimately, growing tired of "doing nothing" began yet another career in oil painting, earning as always consistent ewards for her commendable efforts.

This lady in her fine life of accomplishment has maintained joy as a mascot. It bubbles away beneath the surface of her persona giving her an irresist-

#### ARTIST PROFILE - Greta Grossman

Some call it good karma. Others suggest a heavenly lottery in which a 'thumbs up (lucky life) or 'thumbs down' (forget it) enactment determines future life style conditions. There is also the configuration-of-the-stars-in-the-proper-position theory. And of course, who's to say that this earthly voyage is no more than a simple crap-shoot?

Whichever or whatever, when that little bundle of joy who grew up to be Greta Grossman arrived in Helsingborg, Sweden eighty-three years ago, there began a life that would, by accentuating the positive, create a magnetic field to which abundant measures of pleasures would gravitate.

The remarkable talents of Greta Grossman were inevitable considering that at least a century of paternal ancestors were fine cabinet makers, carpenters and contractors. Her decision to become an industrial designer was considered an awesome choice of career in the zeitgeist of the year, inasmuch as in a span of 200 years no woman had ever occupied a position in this field. Nevertheless, this determined young lady achieved her apprenticeship in cabinet making in Helsingborg where as often as not she was stuck (pun intended) with cleaning the glue pots and wore out a couple of skin growths in so doing. She moved forward, perfecting her expertise at the Stockholm Institute of Industrial Design and ultimately arriving at a position where the name of Greta Grossman became synonymous with high achievement, success, excellence.

In 1933 marriage united this extraordinary woman to one of London's most popular band leaders who had come to Stockholm on a gig and was so enthusiastically received he remained in Sweden.

In 1940, motived by the growing menace of Hitler, the Grossmans fled to American 'the back way' - via Russia, Siberia, Japan, Hawaii. Arriving in San Francisco by ship whose passengers included newsworthy notable, Greta happened (hear timing) to be interviewed by a member of the press. Sufficiently impressed with the lady and her profession, he escorted her to the Annual San Francisco Furniture Mart where a Los Angeles furniture manufacturer (timing again), turned on by her design photos, signed her on the spot and set her up in a studio on (are your ready?) 

# Take a walk on the art

I fwalking is good for the circulatory system, and art is good for the soul and mind, what could be more efficacious than combining the two?

This weekend offers just such an opportunity, in the form of the LeucadiART Walk '89.

Six galleries located along Highway 101 in Leucadia, on either side of the Leucadia Roadside Park, will be welcoming visitors Saturday and Sunday. Art afficienados are encouraged to walk the approximately three-quarter-mile route, visiting each gallery along the way. For participating galleries, just look for the green banner with the sign of the cyprus tree on it.

This is the third annual art walk organized by the Leucadia Art Association. According to the association President Pat Watkins, more than 3,000 people participated in last year's event. They saw more than art, as will this year's walkers.

"You can talk to the artists in the gallery," said Watkins, whose work will be on display this weekend. Artists will be found outside the galleries as well, and Watkins said about 30 artists will be gathered in the Roadside Park.

The Glass Orchid Studio is the southernmost. One of the two owners works in silk flowers, the other in glass. Next, to the north, is the Offtrack Gallery, where several media are displayed. Offtrack will host several demonstrations. Patricia Hildebrand will be showing stained glass techniques Saturday from 10 a.m. until noon. Ron Corr will demonstrate wood-turning from 1 to 3 p.m., while Nancy Rupp will talk about and create Chinese brush work. Lorraine Gibb will be weaving beaded necklaces Sunday from 10 a.m. to noon.

The Stanhope Gallery will be host to Helen Shafer Garcia, who will be on hand to do a little of the watercolor painting for which she is known.

Many artists will be putting on demonstrations at the San Dieguito Art Guild Gallery. Pat McCoury paints in acrylic, Claudia Brown sculpts clay. Boxney Park will be painting See ART WALK/Page B5
