MONTHLY ART SHOW IN SEPTEMBER

It is said that repeated reading of the same words and phrases causes mental blockage. To illustrate, the rules and regulations pertinent to entering SDAG's monthly competitions are generally unaltered month after month, creating a tedious repetition which numbs the brain. Therefore, failing to remember various rules that condition your monthly entries is a given. So, please pay attention to what comes next and we pledge a more emphatic approach henceforth.

SDAG ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: Oil paintings must be dry. All entries require proper framing. This means framing that will survive the pressures of hanging. (What an embarrassment to have your art fall off the wall.) Wiring. Very important. Attach strong hanging wire approximately 2-3 inches below top of painting and give it some slack. For large paintings, framing expert Chuck Bradford suggests a third wire holder at the bottom, running the wire through all three holders in a triangle, which takes the pressure off the bottom. Please be advised: The Art Committee has the right to refuse any painting that fails to meet these conditions.

Bring your entries to the Gallery between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on the following dates:

TAKE-IN DATES: Friday, August 31 and Saturday, September 1.

ENTREE FEES: Paintings 36" or under: \$3.00 per painting. Paintings 37" to 48": \$5.00 per painting.

ARTIST PROFILE - Alta Gans

It hardly seems possible that any same female in her early teens would not go ballistic, almost, for the chance to become the lead vocalist in a popular male dance band. For those of us who, ahem, have passed beyond the age when skin was tight and limbs were loose, wouldn't such an opportunity have been pure quintessence? It happened to Alta Gans and the fact that she was generously blessed with red hair, petite pretty features and, good grief, a lovely singing voice, somehow seems to constitute a shameful unfairness to those not so abundantly endowed.

However, there she was - Alta the alto - a 14 year old high school freshman actually living the dream that many of her peers only fantasized. She was born in Pittsburgh but grew up in Columbus, Ohio. Her musical talent was legitimately inherited from her mother (a soprano) and father (a baritone base). Out of five siblings, three brothers and a sister, Alta grabbed the musical gene. She was nourished via a diet of voice lessons beginning in the 3rd grade and participated in the obvious peripheries - Glee Club, Church Choir, etc. After graduation she exercised her secretarial skills while continuing her vocalist gigs with the various 'in' bands of the era until the winds of war blew through the land creating a zeitgeist of compelling patriotism. With three brothers

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facing uncertain futures, Alta elected to add her personal contribution to the war effort by joining the WACS in 1943.

Hopscotching about the country from camp to camp, she continued her singing career with various military division bands and orchestras and through the Army Special Services Program managed to land the lead of Laurie in a limited engagement of 'Oklahoma' in Fort Benning, Georgia.

Resuming a civilian status after three years of army service, she acquired an agent and began singing professionally in night clubs and private clubs in Pennsylvania, Michigan and the middle West. And it came to pass that she appeared on the same bill as a professional M.C., singer and comedian named Sid Gans for whom a high voltage arcing occurred at his first glimpse of this perky red-headed singer. Standing in a circle of light, spontaneous high drama was played out as Sid Gans announced to the audience, pointing directly at a stunned Alta, "That is the girl I am going to marry!" And, by God, he did - two weeks later in Sharon, Pennsylvania, preceded the day before by a 'first-act' tornado!! After 2-3 years 'on the road' the Gans bought a home in Torrance, Sid seguing into a highly successful career in sales and Alta to the singing of lullables. The Gans produced a daughter and a son - she becoming a sales success and he becoming a TV and movie actor and an incredible impersonator.

Once the nest was vacated, Alta Gans embarked on a series of successes herself which includes: the establishment of Decorating Classes at Montgomery Ward, Torrance, and Ethan Allen Furniture; Personnel Manager at Montgomery Ward, and furniture sales at Sears, Carlsbad.

In the past 13 years, Carlsbad has become the departure point for constant travel itineraries for the Gans, punctuated by Sid Gans' frequent appearances as a character actor in local and regional stage shows and his tennis hobby and Alta Gans' singing engagements, her Bridge, Water-color lessons and photography.

Although Alta Gans joined SDAG as a watercolorist, the discovery of a Photography Category in our monthly art shows has given Alta an audience for her photography hobby. Judging from her awards, sales and comments about her display of "unique and beautiful photographs," the exposure of her talent has altered a hobby that was viewed by a limited circle of family and friends to a collection for the general public to enjoy. And that, certainly, is a plus.

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ARTIST PROFILE - Joyce Patrick

If you were to study the oeuvre of Joyce Patrick, you might find it rather remarkable that the lady was not born clutching a paint brush in her pink dimpled fist. The fact is art, per se, received not much more than a casual passing thought until many milestones had passed in her life. There was osmotic exposure, of course, as when Joyce and her brother were paraded through various museums by their father. But as for any deep penetration, the art urge simply didn't happen then.

Nevertheless, when Joyce Patrick discovered art - or was it vice versa? - a bona fide metamorphoses occurred. It was almost like this latent talent had been slumbering when all of a sudden - bam slam! - there it was (genie in a bottle stuff), exploding with a powerful need to make up for lost time.

With Joyce's art - if you're looking for predictable standards, forget it. However, if you are drawn to art that excites, Joyce Patrick can deliver. No problem. She dares to transit the shadowy paths of experimentation, constantly seeking new techniques with which to project her message. Nor is she stuck in one medium. What the heck, she'll try them all - and succeed. If you wanted to summarize the Patrick approach to art, you could safely say she is 'into' discovery - which gives her work its appealing vitality - its delicious freshness.

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Joyce began life in Kenmore, an upper New York State suburb. Her major at Purdue University was Clothing and Design, recognizable in its earlier incarnation as Home Ec. At the same university, busily engaged in becoming a brilliant expert in organic chemistry, was a young man named Tracy Patrick whose destiny it was to discover a young lady who was, as he was, a counselor in the student dormitories. Don't laugh at cupid's arrows. The consequences are dependably accurate and serious - serious enough, in this case, that Joyce and Tracy spent Joyce's senior year as Mr. and Mrs. Patrick.

Having obtained his Masters and Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry, Tracy Patrick joined Monsanto Company, the third largest chemical company in the country, and remained with them until his retirement. During the years with Monsanto, the Patricks moved about the country - St. Louis, Dayton, Boston - meanwhile laying the foundation of the family structure by producing three children and then after an eleven year pause, a fourth 'tag-along' child.

It was during this home-bound period that Joyce began experimenting with crafts and found art and the love affair commenced.

Primarily Joyce Patrick is a self-proclaimed "people person." Considering her personality, that's easy to accept. But also, she plays golf. She plays bridge. She takes tons of art lessons and workshops. She is certainly no slouch as a cook. And she paints. You don't suppose, do you, that she'd give us a workshop on how to maintain equality with such a creative spread? Quite a lady is Joyce Patrick!!

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
