Walking a spiritual path

Labyrinths are a spiral galaxy of peace

is golf bag holds hockey sticks, rakes and surf-casting rods, tools to carve giant designs in the sand. The beach serves as his canvas, and when Leucadia artist Kirk Van Allyn carves out his meditative labyrinths, hundreds of people watch and wait to walk its intricate path.

"A few years ago, I made one of my best. There must have been 750 people there," said Van Allyn, who goes by the name of Kirkos.

"Everyone started helping me, and it was such a wonderful feeling to have people participate by adding flower petals and candles. There was nice community interaction. Even the dolphins were jumping in the background."

For the past dozen years, Kirkos

has created labyrinths along the coast of Encinitas. On New Year's Day, he'll build an 11-path Chartresstyle design at Stonesteps Beach, inspired by the famous labyrinth at Chartres Cathedral in France.

"It's a spiritual tool, and it's nice to have people, as they walk, help decorate it," Kirkos said. "They can bring colored stones or marbles. It's like a temporary jewel for the celebration of the new year."

Walking a labyrinth has been practiced for centuries; for some, the walk is a metaphor for the journey of life. Some confuse the pattern with a maze. The difference is that a maze is a puzzle, with stops, starts and dead-ends that require analytical thinking to find the way out.

A labyrinth, on the other hand, allows one to walk in a meditative state to its center and back. The way in and the way out are the same.

Some cultures consider it to be a sacred form of geometry, a branch of mathematics that Kirkos finds intriguing.

"I like putting things together," he said. "The joy is discovering these relationships that are intrinsic to everything. You start to recognize a greater depth to things and you experience a shift in perspective."

Physically, the effort of creating the decorative path along the coast can be demanding, Kirkos will incorporate colored sand, 80 pounds of rock salt, a case of table salt and about 25 pounds of colored marbles to outline the looping trail.

"Sometimes things unfold and I'll add squares or little circles or diamonds and repeat the pattern," Kirkos explained.

"If I'm paying attention and concentrating on where my center is, things start to fall in place. Sometimes the tide washes away what I'm trying to do, but the key is to stay in the moment. I use two tapered poles, and when I put them together, I look like a tightrope walker. But it forces me to be graceful. When you do large patterns, you feel the space about you and you see how things are aligned."

A newly added focal point is an eye-catcher placed at the center of his design.

A collector of old scientific equipment, Kirkos uses a diffraction grating from a spectrograph, an instrument used to photographically record the spectrum of light.

"I set that on top of a heliograph;

it's actually an antique World War I signaling mirror," he said.

"People look at this blaze of light and it's like looking at a diamond. It goes from red to violet and people have a remarkable reaction. As they move, it changes colors."

Creating designs on the beach gives Kirkos a sense of purpose, he said. He wants to be considered a "cultural creative," or an artisan who starts cultural traditions. Kirkos is a longtime member of the San Dieguito Art Guild, a nonprofit organization that will have a booth on the beach next to the labyrinth.

The public is encouraged to bring candles and other embellishments to the walk. Afterward, Van Allyn and the guild members will remove everything that isn't biodegradable. Though he's a self-described recluse, Kirkos makes an exception on New Year's Day.

"The way people respond, it's very rewarding, very gratifying. The labyrinth is an automatic mixer because you walk by everyone and meet people on the path. I get to hug people and that's wonderful."



Kirkos makes mathema

Internationally known environmental artist Kirk Van Allyn, a.k.a. "Kirkos," will draw a meditation labyrinth New Year's Day on the sand of Stonesteps Beach, 350 South El Portal, Encinitas. The public interactive event is 2-5 p.m. The labyrinth can be viewed from the bluffs above the sand drawing or by strolling half a mile north from Moonlight Beach in Encintres.

Kirkos, a long-time member of the San Dieguito Art Guild and Off Track Gallery, is dedicating his labyrinth to the guild in appreciation of their support for his art.

The public is invited to bring gifts for the labyrinth, items should be biodegradable such as flowers, colored stones, and coarse salt. Candles, which will be removed later, are also welcome.

Kirkos, a resident of Leucadia, has long been interested in applied mathematical design and engineering. He has traveled all over the world, first in his navigational work on the tracking ships for the Apollo space program, and later with Scripps Institute of Oceanography and then with other private marine design/engineering and aerospace companies.

Kirkos is inspired by such notables as Andy Goldsworthy, Escher, and Christos. Because of the proximity of his working location on the beach to downtown Encinitas, many tourists and fans are drawn to take a further look at his photographic, work at the nearby Off Track Gallery, 500 Second Street.

Making art in the sand

I transform the tidal sand with mandala-like patterns and symbols, i.e. the labyrinth, which is a walking meditative tool. The joy of my art is the act of discovering new techniques and tools that allow me to express the desired effect in texture and berm. A 15-loot-long carbon fiber surf casting pole is perfect for laying out a matrix grid.

A hockey stick makes the most ideal lotus petal stylus. My ebb tidal art, for which "Kirkos" is best known, is dramatically executed at Beacons, Swamis, Stone Step and Grand View beaches in Encinitias. The

forms I draw sometimes are sacred geometric patterns found in nature, such as the labyrinth design, a walking meditation. I aim to create patterns of great scale and beauty, which use the grand natural carvas of the ebb tide sand.

People ask if I mind seeing my art washed away. No, it's like someone playing music—it's for the moment, in an hour it's gone, but it stays with you.

Observers, especially children, are drawn into the center of this archetypical art. I remember a young child coming up to me after walking through the pattern on the beach with his father, and saying. "I'll remember you forever."

From a distance, perspective demonstrates its unique principles. One cannot view the whole from only one perspective. Various patterns of relationships are discovered from these geometric experiments. On the most fundamental level of seeing lines drawn on the sand, the viewer can perceive interrelationships and metaphorical connotations of these 100-foot shapes and patterns. Mathematical truths are revealed in these relationships, it's like mathematical poetry.


"Kirkos" comes from a mathematical dictionary. It means "circler" in Greek and small "circus" in Latin... This term perfectly describes my beach art.

Did you know... that our Guild is over 43 years old?

he San Dieguito Art Guild was founded in 1965. Sue Beere (who we are told worked in oil, painted horses and lived at 1265 Cuchara Drive in Del Mar) wanted to start an art group. She called together friends and neighbors for coffee on her patio. In this first meeting were Marjorie Morgan, Agnes de Lambert, Dorothy Woolley, Bill Wicknick, Dorothy Telford, Mary Bricker, Mary Elsie Davis, Jo Fisher, Mrs. James F. Kuidor, Erma Lawson, Marie Angenent and Catherine Curran and Vilma Malmberg (Vilma is still an active member of our Guild!). Sue Beere was elected the first president and Olivia Walker-Priller, vice president.

Notes from that first meeting established that the purpose of the Guild was to "promote greater understanding and appreciation of the fine arts in the San Dieguito area."

"Presenting workshops, classes, art shows and to attract well-known artists to conduct classes and, eventually, the Guild's own permanent home," were mentioned as goals of the group.

The first 100 members to join the newly formed San Dieguito Art Guild were designated charter members. These included Marjorie La Ray, Kirby Sumner, Lee Woods, Ann Knapton, Mavia L. Shortlidge, Ruth Roebuck, Betty Hammond, Bonney Park (aunt to our current member, Charlene Bonney) and George Hukar among many others.

The first gallery was on Highway 101 in Del Mar (maybe at or near where the old Earth Song Book Store was). There was a barber shop nearby where Vilma says she used to go and chat with the barber when things were slow. The name of the Gallery was the "Blue Lantern". Perhaps the building had a blue lantern or perhaps that was the name of the building -- no one knows. The gallery was located in a tiny store building next to the Chamber of Commerce in Del Mar. Here, members were able to hold workshops and hang paintings. It was described as a hole in the wall. No one seems to remember exactly where the first gallery was, but it is remembered that there was a drug store, a liquor store and at the end a pharmacy. If anyone happens to have any more information about this please let us know.

The shrink wrap bins are getting too full!! It's time for everyone to follow the guidelines of the Gallery Committee as found each month in The Paint Rag -- about 2/3s of the way down the column titled Monthly Show Rules.

These steps need to be taken:

- **1.** Members with thick backing need to change it to the 1/8" backing requirement.
- 2. Some members aren't putting their names and/or prices on. Very few are marking "Original" or "Print".
- **3.** The next time you are in the Gallery, please clean your shrinks that have been there 6 months or more.
- **4.** Check behind the "up to 9x12" rack (in the small room) for those extra shrinks you need to take home.

Kirkos-Modern Day Daedalus

He will begin at about 1:30 to 2:00 pm and keep working for the next two or three hours until he is finished. SDAG members (and the public of course) are encouraged to bring bio-degradable "gifts" for the labyrinth. These gifts could be flowers, coarse salt, colored



stones, etc. We may also bring candles set in small paper bags (which Kirk will collect at the end of the evening). All members are encouraged to join the celebration and bring your friends and guests. It will be

Kirk made a labyrinth on behalf of the Guild three years ago.

That labyrinth was sponsored by San Chereskin, an Encinitas architect. Sam donated \$1000 to the Guild for sponsorship. We don't have a sponsor at this time, but we are working on it. The last time we did this we drew a crowd of over 700 peo-



ple who walked the labyrinth and attended the sunset ceremony.

In Greek mythology, the Labyrinth was an elaborate structure designed and built by the legendary artificer Daedalus for King



Minos of Crete at Knossos. Its function was to hold the Minotaur, a creature that was half man and half bull and was eventually killed by the Athenian hero Theseus. Daedalus had made the Labyrinth so cunningly that he himself could barely escape it after he

built it. Theseus was aided by Ariadne, who provided him with a fateful thread, literally the "clew", or "clue", to wind his way back again.

A labyrinth can be represented both symbolically and physically. Symbolically, it is represented in art or designs on pottery, as body art, etched on walls of caves, etc. Physical representations are common throughout the world and are generally constructed on the ground so they may be walked along from entry point to center and back again. They have historically been used in both group ritual and for private meditation.

Roy Soravia Collection at the Gallery



As a painter dedicated to the Op Art movement of the 1950's and 60's much of Roy Soravia's work has been recognized by experts to be reminiscent of the paintings of highly regarded Victory Vasarely and Yaacov Agam.

His belief that the use of line, color and form is more important than the representation of a given subject.

Soravia's painstaking methods and great attention to color variations yielded work that are not only pleasing to behold but have the magical quality of changing before the viewer's eye.

Soravia's paintings have been exhibited in Chicago, Omaha, Davenport Museum and in California at the San Diego Museum of Fine Arts, the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art, La Jolla Atheneum Gallery at the University of California at San Diego and the Coronado School of Fine Arts.

Roy's last painting was dated in the year 2000 and he died four years later at the age of 100.

Monthly Show Rules

- There is 10 % commission on wall and floor art and shrink wraps. There is no commission on cards. An additional 5.4% is charged for credit card sales
- All work must be original and for sale
- TAKE-IN IS THE LAST TUESDAY OF THE MONTH from 9:30 a.m. – Noon.
- Please have your take-in sheet and take-in tags (found in the Paint Rag) already filled out for take in day
- Work must be framed unless you use wrap-around canvas stapled on the back (no staples on the sides).
 Frames must be attached professionally (ask for advice from an art supply store like Rhino or Aaron Bros. No bent-over nails or staples to hold the frame)
- The wires should be attached to wall art "1/4 to 1/5 of the way down from the top of the frame.
- You must have your name and the title of your piece on the reverse of your work
- Do not bring wet paintings
- You must have a multi-strand wire (please do not use the saw-toothed hangers that usually come with ready made frames) attached securely approximately ¼ of the way down from the top of frame and slack enough to come to approximately 2 inches from the top of the frame. Please tape the ends of the wire (loose wire ends can cut the hands of those doing the hanging)
- Be sure your work looks as nice as it can, well puttogether frame, clean well-cut mat.
- The Guild reserves the right to refuse entries that do not meet SDAG standards
- Prints made from original art (such as Giclees) must clearly be identified as reproductions/prints (this includes those in the shrink wrap bin). California state law requires all reproductions to be numbered editions. Buyers deserve to know the number of copies available. Signed editions are generally thought of as more valuable to collectors. NOTE: Giclees are not included in the judging.
- Calligraphy as part of the art piece is acceptable

SHRINK WRAPS

Each SDAG member may show 2 large and 5 small shrink—wrap pieces. There is no charge for showing shrink-wraps. Shrink-wraps have 10% commission on them. They must be enclosed in crystal clear envelopes with the artist name, the title and the price of the art piece clearly readable and in a place that it can be seen from the outside of the envelope. Full size shrink-wraps should not be any larger then the art bin. Small size shrink-wrap should be 9"x12" or smaller. All shrink-wraps should have a 1/8" matt-board or formcore on the back of them. Please no thick backing since it takes up to much room in the bins. All shrink-wrap art must be clearly marked as an ORIGINAL or as a PRINT

CARDS

Every member can show cards and use 2 card slots if there is room on the rack. Artists do not pay commission on cards and there is no charge for displaying cards. All card requests must go through Barbara Mille, Floor Chair.






dream come true to have the permanent collection still here in Encinitas, in the library for the time being.

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




